By all accounts the Holiday Concert will be one to remember, so I want to take this time to lift up a performance I had the pleasure to be taken to yesterday by Jolinda Stephens, *Black Nativity* by the Nia Performing Arts Theatre Company. As far as I'm concerned this is Columbus' show of the year. From the very first number all the way through the energy was palpable and nonstop. As Jolinda mentioned, the only problem was that the stage at the Martin Luther King Center wasn't large enough to accommodate the 60+ members of the cast, most of whom were on stage throughout the show.

There were a number of child actors who were able to be children on stage, and who were also integral to the overall performance. And I have to admit that I thought the baby Jesus was the most life-like baby doll I'd ever seen until the child started kicking its foot during a number Mary and Joseph were singing. Wow. Nothing like a little reality to drive the point home.

The only lingering negative point was that the show put my previous favorite *Black Nativity*, by the excellent Penumbra Theater Company in St Paul, MN, to shame.

Like I said, Nia's *Black Nativity* was the show of the year. Of course, our own Choir Concert starts in just a few minutes. They may take top billing soon enough.

COMMON READ Eboo Patel's memoir *Acts of Faith*, a Beacon Press book, has been selected by the Unitarian Universalist Association as the 2011-2012 *Common Read*. Patel is founder and executive director of *Interfaith Youth Core*, an international, non-profit youth service leadership organization.

The *Common Read* invites participants to read and discuss the same book in a given time period. This is a way to build community in our congregation and movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversation.

A committee of UUA staff selected *Acts of Faith*. Ten years after 9/11, the book describes the vulnerability of youth to violent, fundamentalist influences, and makes a case for all of us, particularly youth, to promote pluralism by engaging in interfaith and social justice work.

As a first step in working with Patel's book in our congregation, Rev. Kathleen Fowler will focus on it in her sermon of February 26.

LABYRINTH returns to First UU over Holidays

Add to the enjoyment and your spiritual experience of the Holidays by “walking the Labyrinth” at First UU. The 11-circuit pattern, reproducing the 1201 A.D. Chartres Cathedral original, will be returning to us on Monday, December 26. It will be located in the Worship Center and be available from 10am through 9pm each day through Sunday, January 1, 2012. New Year’s Day has long been a favorite time for a contemplative walk!

Psychologist Carl Jung called the labyrinth an “archetype of transformation.” Walkers along its sinuous path find they are often deeply affected. Rev. Lauren Artress of Grace Cathedral in San Francisco, writes that people in transition periods find a calmer perspective; those with untapped gifts to offer have their creative fires rekindled; walkers dealing with grief experience peace. For millennia, the circling path that evolved from the simple spiral brought centeredness and healing to untold numbers of walkers.

Instructions and guidelines, along with information about labyrinths around Central Ohio and elsewhere, will be available. Walk in silence, with gentle music on CD, or live meditative music.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

The History of Campus Programs Part II

In October 1944, one of the newsletters lead articles was "Students Are Back." Rev. Frank Ricker asked the members of congregation to invite them to a home dinner. At the end of the month, the first "Town and Gown" meeting was held. All the "OSU gang and their working or soldiering colleges were invited to attend." The session was a getting-acquainted one with refreshments served.

By November a clear program was outlined for Sunday evenings beginning at the Unitarian House, starting with supper (25¢) followed by specific speakers, panels or discussions. Some topics included *Preventing Juvenile Delinquency*, *Psychology of Blindness and the Economic Situation Thereof* (with blind church member Milton Klein from the State Commission for the Blind) and *Anti-Semitism and Military Conscriptioin*. Guest speakers from various faiths presented: William Kappes of Holy Name, Rabbi Moshe Goldblume of Tiferith Israel, Chaplain Whipple from Fort Hayes (then a military base).

The programs continued through that year and into 1945, 1946 and 1947. Rev. Ricker, church members and student leaders prepared programs and had them in place at the beginning of each quarter. Professors from Ohio State University were often tapped to present. At the end of the year in June 1945, Rev. Ricker prepared a supper of waffles. The members of *Town and Gown* presented an entertainment program in July.

In October 1947 *Town and Gown* became the *Channing Foundation* and the price of supper went to 35¢. At this time, the church home was located at 175 W. 11th Avenue, south of campus. Program descriptions can be found in the newsletter of the period. Some exchange programs with Hillel occurred during the year, such as Jewish music, ancient and modern.

In January 1948 the first meeting featured Dr. Meno Lovenstein of the OSU Department of Economics, speaking on *Henry Wallace and a Third Party*. Other speakers during the quarter included Fr. William Kappes whose topic was *Housing and Catholic charities*; Sgt. Lester Shaw, Ret. Columbus Police and head of Columbus NAACP on *Civil rights in Columbus*.

The Channing Foundation program was mentioned from January through September 1949 when an open house was held at 8:00 p.m. at the church for OSU students. Little notice is given in the newsletter after that meeting. (This article continues a project of writing a chronological history of campus programs. -- Linda Thompson, Historian.)



For Unto Us/Hallelujah/Gloria Three energizing and glorious musical experiences have me wondering why they have such a strongly positive effect on me. True, they are all expressions of musical genius, but I don't believe the words in any of them. The three musical events are the Columbus Messiah Sing Along, the Black Nativity and Psalm 150 from Jenkins' *Gloria* performed at second worship this morning. Many of the words for the Messiah and the Black Nativity were identical: *For unto us a child is born/ and his name shall be called/ Glory to God/Hallelujah*. The joy was the same, the beat was different; and while the orchestra at the sing-along was definitely professional, the singing for the Black Messiah was much more professional than the sing-along that included rank amateurs like me.

Jenkins' *Psalm 150* differed from both. It is crisp, staccato, harsh and soaring. The words are also words of praise for a god. My quick summary is "Praise God for being powerful and amazing. Praise her with all kinds of instruments, with song, and with dance." And our Chalice Choir was awe-inspiring in their own right. Still I don't believe a word of any of it. So, why does it make me feel so joyous?

Maybe the answer is somewhere in Rev. Mark's charming retelling this morning of a Kenyan story of the love of the sun and the moon that keeps the earth alive. Maybe it's somewhere in the book I just finished with the tantalizing title of *Love Wins*. Love triumphs. No matter how cold it gets. Ultimately, love soars and sings and makes a very joyful noise.

May love win you this season. May each and every one of us express love, rather than wait for it to find us.

Our Whole Lives, or OWL, is the values-based, comprehensive sexuality education program developed by our own UUA and the United Church of Christ. OWL values self-worth, sexual health, responsibility, justice and inclusiveness.

First Grade OWL supports parents in educating children about birth, babies, bodies, families and being safe. Following Parent/Child orientation, the eight sessions engage children with stories, songs and activities and include a weekly HomeLink - a homework project for parents and children to do together. It promotes dialog between parents and children.

Fifth and Sixth Grade OWL is an eight-session program for learning about and discussing the physical and emotional changes of puberty. Participants read *It's Perfectly Normal* by Robie H. Harris, and examine topics such as values and sexuality, communication and decision making. Each session includes a HomeLink - a homework activity for parents and children to complete together.

UU Radio is on the web and Our Se'lavi Murals are on display Don't miss the results of our work in Sunday School this month as we worked with the worship theme, *Hope*, and the book for the month, *Se'lavi: A Haitian Story of Hope*. From the book we took the ideas of using murals and radio to draw attention to needs for justice and fairness. The murals are on display in the main hall that leads to the back parking lot. There's lots of messages from our children there. They invite you to take some time to read them.

The 11am 4th and 5th grade group worked with Neal Schmitt to create a radio show. The children identified the issues and wrote their scripts and presented them. It is on the First UU website: www.firstuucolumbus.org. Look in the center of the home page and scroll down, looking for the picture of the book.

The Inner Flame

Everything will come into its former strength,
The fields no longer divided,
waters no longer dammed,
the trees fully grown,
and all the walls built low.
