It might have something to do with being the child of American suburbia, but every now and then I find myself fascinated by rather old things.

Last week I was captivated by a story about Russian scientists who found DNA from a 32,000 year old arctic flower and brought it back to life. (Search for "arctic flower" on CNN.com or Google to find coverage of the story.)

Oh, I know that planets and stars and other examples of star-stuff are much older, but those are at scales that, try as I might, I'll never be able to fathom. And while 32,000 years is still a stretch, it's on much more of a human scale than 13.75 billion years.

I've been to Dun Angus, the stony remains of a 5,000 year old fort on the western edge of Inishmore, one of the Aran Islands off the coast of Galway. That folk back then made the passage to the island of Ireland itself was doubly amazing to me as the crossing of the ferry I took to get there was so rough that I wondered if it might make more sense for me to just stay there for the rest of my life.

I've also seen a small patch of woven linen that was supposedly the same age as Dun Angus, having been buried in the muck at the edge of a lake. And, of course, in Ohio we have the burial mounds of the Hopewell and Adena peoples.

But 32,000 years? That's as old as the oldest known paintings in the Chauvet cave in southern France. That's really old.

All of these examples help me keep things in perspective: what will last, what won't, and what a simply amazing world we live in and call home.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS The Board of Trustees will be hosting three more open forums to share information about the upcoming vote at the June Annual Meeting on the proposed amendments to our Church Constitution. A red-lined version of the proposed amended Constitution can be found on the church website: firstuucolumbus.org. The changes reflect the work of a task force and the attention of your current Board and are designed to bring the Constitution up-to-date with how the church currently operates, and to set forth and/or clarify procedures for unlikely scenarios: going out of business, dismissing called ministers, removing Board members. The changes were carefully thought out by the task force, and reviewed, discussed,

and revised by the Board throughout the fall of 2011.

Please join Board members on one or more of the following occasions: from 7-9 pm at the Program Council meeting on Monday, March 5; Wednesday, March 7, 7-9 pm in Room 6; Sunday March 25, 12:30-2:00 pm.

After more than two years of negotiations with Franklin County Treasurer Ed Leonard, BREAD is pleased to announce that the Franklin County Board of Commissioners voted unanimously to establish the Franklin County Land Bank Program. Immediately prior to the vote, Commissioner Paula Brooks referred to BREAD as “the conscience of Columbus.”

The Land Bank Program will expand the County’s authority to demolish or rehabilitate Franklin County’s 7,000 vacant and tax-delinquent properties. See <http://treasurer.franklincountyohio.gov/foreclosure/land-bank> for more information.

BREAD’s Land Bank Committee is asking BREAD members to nominate vacant houses for action. What's So Dangerous About Art? What's So Sacred About Art? 5 sessions, Thursdays, 7pm starting March 1

Join philosophy professor and artist Susan Josephson in an exploration of art as seen down through the ages through the eyes of philosophers, theologians, artists and you. The provocative conversations include: **March 1** - The power of art in relation to the sacred, and why people have found it dangerous. Why have religions banned representational art?

March 8 - The Neo-Platonic view that art is central to religion and artists are religious leaders. Is beauty good?

March 15 - Tolstoy and his idea that the true purpose of art is to infect the viewer with the most spiritually evolved emotions of the age so that the human spirit can progress. **March 22** - Classical Indian art theory teaches that art gives rise to emotionally flavored bliss.
