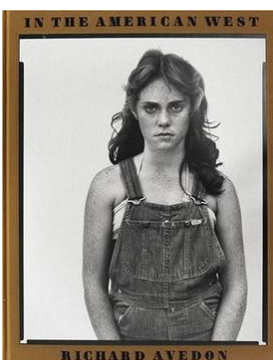

“Yes, there is beauty and there are the humiliated. Whatever the difficulties the enterprise may present, I would like never to be unfaithful either to one or the others.” Albert Camus

Beauty. We would do well to show each other the beauty we have found more often.

As his birthday would have been last month, I’ve been thinking about my late father, and for whatever reason, I’ve been thinking about a conversation we had after seeing together an exhibition of photographs by Richard Avedon from his *In The American West* project.



Avedon was a New York portrait and fashion photographer, who was commissioned by a museum in Fort Worth, Texas to portray those in the West. Five years later he had photographed over 750 ranchers, waitresses, homemakers and homeless folks in their everyday, often soiled, clothes. His book of those photographs was published in 1985.

Dad wasn’t impressed by the larger-than-life-sized black and white prints of these “everyday” people. While he wanted more beauty on display at a museum, I found a consistent attractive strength beneath the grit and scars on display. To his credit, Dad liked that I was thinking for myself, even if he wanted nothing more to do with Richard Avedon after that afternoon. I tell this little story because, as important as beauty is in all its forms, it can be simple and it can be deeply complex and hard won.

The recent solar eclipse awed millions across a wide swath of our nation. How we needed that in the midst of all the pain of the summer.

Returning to Albert Camus' message above, to be faithful both to beauty and to those who feel themselves humiliated, I'm struck by how my father may have seen Avedon's subjects as just that – humiliated. Clearly these are people with stories to tell. The question remains, "Just who was willing to listen?" And maybe, just maybe, that impulse to listen more deeply is one of the most beautiful things of all.

Certainly that's what we strive to help one another do here at First UU. Are we masters of this art? Not always. But we do gently challenge one another to stretch ourselves as we come together to share our own stories of what it means to be human in this day and age. What stories do you still yearn to tell?

The Beauty in Our Days

This past week, I had a tough conversation, one where I needed to apologize to a friend for a way I had wronged them. It took a while for us to get on the phone and a good portion of that time, I was dreading the conversation. Putting off something I am not looking forward to always seems to make it worse. Have you had this experience too?



We got on the phone and instantly settled in to catching up. It was so good to hear about how he had been doing, as we had been out of touch for a while. I was waiting for the right moment to make my apology and it opened up—just at the right time. I was standing outside and as we talked, both of our hearts opened up. And as our hearts opened up, my perspective opened up. I was sitting outside, surrounded by the beauty of that natural world. As my apology was being accepted and gratitude was being shared between us, a feather flew by on the wind, reminding me of the beauty of this and every season of our lives.

One of the deep truths about being human and being alive is that our lives go through seasons. There are times of feeling good and times of feeling despair, times to be joyful and times of seemingly paralyzing anxiety. We must feel the good to feel the bad, and we must feel the bad to feel the good. On this day, I knew I needed to be honest in order for our hearts to open up, in order to see the beauty between and around us.

I wonder what season you are going through at this point in your life. Are you in a joyful place? In a place of difficulty? In a space entirely in-between? Are you in a place where you can take a step back and admire the beauty that surrounds you? Anywhere can be beautiful. And beauty can be in the eye of the beholder.

Following this conversation, I realized I was feeling more alive, with the aliveness that comes with being humbly honest, with listening to another person, with owning our own stuff. Perhaps that day it wasn't just about the physical beauty of the place in which I was standing, but more about the beauty of the experience I was having. Howard Thurman tells us, "Do not ask what the world needs. Ask yourself what makes you come alive, and then go and do that. Because what the world needs is more people who have come alive."

My wish for each of you is to find the beauty and alive-ness in your days, to find the beauty in your lived experiences, in your surroundings, in the least expected places. May it be so for all of us.

Your Board of Trustees meets monthly on the fourth Wednesday, 7-9pm. Everyone is welcome and childcare will be available starting in September as a part of *Wednesdays on Weisheimer*. Here's a sampling of what goes on at a meeting:

- Opening words, chalice lighting and check-in.
- Approving the consent agenda shared prior to the meeting (reports from staff, minutes and followup).
- Membership and Welcoming. Eric informed us about *Wednesdays on Weisheimer*, which begins September 13, and rainbow umbrellas for rainy Sunday mornings.
- Coordinating Team. Lane reported that information is being gathered for Rev. Marian, the Safety Taskforce report is under review, and a transgender event is upcoming.
- Finance and Stewardship. The July financial report was reviewed and accepted.
 - Current year pledges collected totaled \$71,885.
 - Expenses totaled \$72,915, including \$62,319 personnel and facilities \$7,027.

Additional info: First UU has a mortgage of \$460,300 that matures on 6/1/2029 with a balloon payment due at that time. Monthly mortgage payments are \$38,500 and about \$22,00 of that is interest.

- Youth Group. Nate Blake and Lee Cook reported that the group seeks to become more welcoming with elimination of dues and a later start time.
- Governance Work. This is the leadership work of the board. Topics change throughout the year. Currently, we are discussing:
 - Engaging diversity inside and outside our walls
 - Communication with members and friends of First UU
 - Potential amendments to our church constitution
- Thank you notes:
 - Heather Pierson, for many years of Youth Group leadership
 - Pam Hussen, a long-time gardener, for caring for the church grounds
 - Joe Voltolini, Bookkeeper, for working hard to change to our new church financial record keeping software
 - Barb Fisher, for deep-cleaning the kitchen and dish areas, and building furniture and deep-cleaning and preparing Rev. Marian's office

GREETINGS, FIRST UU COLUMBUS!

My name is Amanda Hays, and I am your new Ministerial Intern. I grew up in the South Hills of Pittsburgh but lived in Grand Rapids, Michigan until last summer. I live with my husband Jim in the Near East side of Columbus in an intentional living community. Gardening, cooking, biking, board gaming, and rock climbing are some of my favorite hobbies. I am also passionate about building community, fighting for social justice, seeking spiritual meaning, and being present with people.

I am new to Unitarian Universalism. I grew up Evangelical and became Reformed in college. During a gap year in Cambodia, I sensed a call to ministry and moved back to Michigan to start seminary. While I was in seminary, my college boyfriend and I got married, and soon after, we both became agnostic. The transition was confusing and painful, but we believed, based on the values our faith had taught us, that this change was right. In Unitarian Universalism, we found a new faith community with a love for questioning and searching.

I have transferred to Meadville Lombard Theological School in Chicago, and am taking distance-intensive M.Div. courses while interning. Last year, I interned with the Juvenile Justice Coalition, which fights the school-to-prison pipeline through state legislation. I attended hearings inside the statehouse and protested outside it with the People's Justice Project. I supported at-risk youth through the Voices of the Unheard youth group, and built relationships with Columbus community organizers.

This fall, I begin my ministerial internship at First UU. Since I visited First UU last summer, I have been impressed and intrigued by the wealth of talent, community, and intentionality. I am excited to learn from this community and to bring my own passions, experiences, and connections as well.

I attended my fifth Unitarian Universalist Musicians Network annual conference, this year in Arlington, VA, in July. It is a meeting of UU music and choir directors from all over the US and Canada. About 200 strong, we make up the best choir I have ever been in, all of them accomplished singers and musicians. We sing for the Sunday service of the host church, plus for conducting and composition workshops, and we sight-read tons of music, much of which I brought home for our choirs to use.

SOLIDARITY AND SANCTUARY CIRCLES: NEXT STEPS

As Unitarian Universalists, we covenant to confirm and promote the inherent worth and dignity of every person. The Underground Railroad was the salvation for many people of color during the 1800s. Abolitionists and sympathizers helped people find freedom by putting themselves at risk. During World War II, sympathizers helped Jews and other Europeans escape the wrath of Hitler and the Nazis.

Now is our time. Refugees and immigrants (documented and undocumented) are now facing difficult times in our country. Rapidly escalating deportations of our neighbors who have lived in this country for years, more than 400 per day nationwide, are tearing families apart and upending communities. LGBTQ rights are being rolled back. People of color are facing increased threats.

First UU members and friends were busy during July and August, laying the groundwork for Solidarity and Sanctuary at First UU. We held four introductory sessions, during which we learned about immigration law, the civil process of reporting, detention, and deportation, and the history of the sanctuary movement in the United States. We are making connections with the greater Columbus community to assess needs and have talked with another Ohio UU congregation involved in the Sanctuary Movement.

UU-UNO News The UUA's United Nations Office is engaged in international advocacy work based on UU values. From involvement in the drafting of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, to leading the faith caucus to establish the International Criminal Court, to overcoming UN apathy about sexual orientation and gender identity issues, the [UU-UNO has a long history](#) of providing strong leadership in all aspects of human rights at a policy level through UN consultative status. One recent proclamation: The United Nations has just banned nuclear weapons! The Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons was adopted July 7, and makes illegal all production, testing, use, or threats of nuclear weapons under international law. While this won't immediately rid the world of nuclear weapons, we should celebrate this crucial step toward achieving the long-term goal of global nuclear disarmament! The UU-UNO, as part of the NGO Committee on Disarmament, Peace, and Security is proud to have been part of this effort and will continue working at the United Nations to achieve the goals set forth in the Treaty.

Because of your support, we've had two victories this summer. Columbus City Council passed an ordinance pushing construction companies doing business with the city to hire formerly-incarcerated people ([WSYX report](#)). Meanwhile, Columbus is rolling out an evidence-based violence prevention strategy that has led to significant reductions in violent crime in other cities ([Dispatch article](#)).

Our annual Listening Process begins this month. Congregations around the city will hold small group discussions to share the community concerns that weigh heavily on our hearts and minds. The stories shared in these discussions will help BREAD choose a new problem to focus on in the coming year. Kaylee is from Indiana and came to Ohio in December. She has no family here. She has a two-year old little boy named Kaiser and left an abusive relationship in Indiana. Kaiser was born at 33 week's gestation and spent a month in a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. Kaylee was living with her boyfriend Kevin at his mother's house in South Columbus initially, but had to leave. She went to the YWCA Family Center because she was essentially homeless. The YWCA program referred her to CAREHOME, a program of the Church for All People which provides not only affordable housing, but also case management services so that the mother and unborn baby get medical care, parenting guidance and referrals for whatever else is needed. That's where First UU comes in.

Stuart Smith and I met with Kaylee to see what her priorities were. She is a sweet young woman and her little boy took an immediate shine to Stuart.

The shower was fun and festive. We had lots of very cute clothes, toys, a car seat, stroller for two, a couple of dressers and a delicious homemade cake. Kaylee's sister was here from Indiana to support her and lots of First UU members attended to celebrate and support this little family.

Stuart and I delivered the larger gifts afterward and saw the refurbished home provided by CAREHOME. It is situated in South Columbus and is attractive AND affordable. We will be in contact with the social worker who is working with Kaylee to see what the next steps are.
