And then in an excellent book of quotations from the interviews of Oprah Winfrey (thank you for the gift, Rev. Marian), The Wisdom of Sundays, this gem from Father Richard Rohr –

Success doesn't teach you anything. I'm going to say up to the age of thirty, you need some success to create your ego structure. But it's an arbitrary number. After thirty, everything I've learned has been from humiliation, sin, failure, rejection, betrayal. That's where my soul expands. Now, I don't like it. And I don't know it till afterward, too. You know, you want to get rid of it. But then two days later, in the surrendering, the accepting, the seeing, I realize I'm larger and larger.

Sometimes the truth hurts, and this has the ring of truth to it, at least in my book.

Maybe it's because I'm in my 50s now, but the goal I'm setting for myself is not the Olympic ideal. I find myself warming ever more to my 100-year-old mother-in-law, Nana.

Letting Our Love Shine

A couple of weeks ago, First UU Columbus began our first-ever *Families Working for Justice* small group. This is a group of parents and caregivers exploring ways to get their families involved in justice struggles, taking into account time constraints and safety concerns for young children. From the very start, parents kept love at the center, with conversation about our deepest-held values and what fuels the justice work we want to see done in the world.



Now, *Families Working for Justice* is teaming up with the Ohio Poor People's Campaign to offer other families a chance to get involved in this important work. The Poor People's Campaign is a national movement picking up the work Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King began shortly before his death, of putting the rights of those most marginalized at the center of the movement. This campaign prioritizes the stories and experiences of folks who are underrepresented—people of color, people living in poverty, women, children, LGBTQ people, and those with disabilities.

You are invited to join the Poor People's Campaign as a family, by coming to a Family Teach-In, with opportunities to tell stories about the Poor People's Campaign, to tell stories of our families, and to involve the whole family in making signs for upcoming actions happening between May 13 and June 21. The Family Teach-In takes place Saturday, March 31, from 10am to 1:30pm at First UU. Please come join us!

If this day does not work for you, not to worry. There will be a family-led action that takes place the week of May 13. More details will come along later this month.

OVERCOMING THE HUMILITY PARADOX

According to tradition, the Torah (the first five books of the Hebrew Scriptures) was written by Moses. Most scholars think the Torah was not written by one person but compiled from several sources over hundreds of years. But I still have to chuckle whenever I come across this verse and imagine Moses writing it: “Now Moses was a very humble man, more humble than anyone else on the face of the earth.” (Numbers 12:3).

Humility can feel paradoxical. Is it even possible for a person to rate their own humility? If I say I am a very humble person, it seems I am not; but wouldn't admitting to a lack of humility demonstrate humility? Or is that false humility?

One definition I have heard tries to get around this paradox: “Humility is not thinking less of yourself, but thinking of yourself less.” I suppose if this is the case, a humble person could say that they were humble...as long as they didn't do so too often. But if humility is really about forgetting oneself, UU ministers are in trouble! The formation process I am going through to become a UU minister requires constantly thinking about myself, speaking about myself, and writing about myself. And of course, it's not just ministers who go through periods of self-reflection. Our fourth principle urges us all to go on our own free and responsible search for truth and meaning, and our third principle says we should encourage each other toward spiritual growth. Both of these involve serious self-reflection.

I remember being initially shocked when a friend, after cooking a meal for me, unselfconsciously proclaimed, “This turned out delicious!” (and she was right). I grew up in a household where this would have been considered bragging. In my family, the cook often made self-deprecating comments about the food they made; others then gave compliments to reassure them. On reflection, I found this friend's habit of unabashedly giving an honest evaluation of her own cooking refreshing.

My friend's take on humility reminds me of a passage from the Christian Scriptures: “Don't think you are better than you really are. Be honest in your evaluation of yourselves...We are many parts of one body, and we all belong to each other” (Romans 12:3-5).

What the verse doesn't say, but which I will add, is: “Don't think you are less than you really are, either.” What if humility is less about downplaying our strengths or ignoring ourselves and more about our capacity to know ourselves and admit to our own limits? This type of humility is about trusting that we live in the interdependent web of all existence. Humility allows us to work together in community like parts of a single body. When we can name our own strengths without fear of the humility paradox, our community knows what they can call on us to do. And when we admit where our limits are, we avoid burning ourselves out and create trust and space for others to join in.

BREAD (*Building Responsibility, Equality, and Dignity*, 614-220-9363, www.breadcolumbus.com, www.facebook.com/breadorganization) is Central Ohio's congregation-based, multi-faith community organization that uses the power of organized people to hold local officials accountable for serious community problems.

First UU's **Justice Ministry Network Organizing Meeting** will be on **Sunday, March 4 at 1pm** in the Worship Center. We will have refreshments starting at 12:45, and childcare will be available. We should be done by 2:30 at the latest. Our congregation's Network is critical in turning out at least 350 people from the First UU community at BREAD's **Nehemiah Action on Monday, May 7, at 6:40pm**.

This meeting will prepare Network members to be successful in inviting people to the Nehemiah Action. We will hear updates from BREAD's four campaigns: **Juvenile Justice, Municipal ID, Jobs, and Youth/Family Concerns**. The new Youth & Family Research Committee has identified three possible directions (kinship care, affordable housing, and youth mental health) and wants our input. Each Network member will create a list of people to invite, and we'll discuss how to do so. By staying informed and getting organized, we can build the power we need to build a more just and humane Central Ohio.

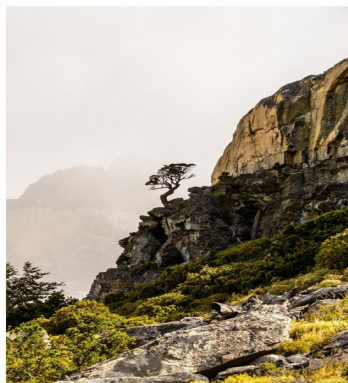
If you're not yet a member of our Justice Ministry Network, we invite you to come to the meeting anyway, to learn about how BREAD works and the status of our campaigns.

One recipe for a humble pie captures the complexity of humility itself. It calls for 2 cans Understanding, 2 cups Love, 2 cups Compassion, 3 cups Humility, 1 cup Forgiveness, 1/2 cup Peace, 1/2 cup Acceptance, 1/4 cup Success, 1/4 cup Failure, 2 tbsp Temptation, 1 tsp Remorse, 1 tsp Guilt, and 1 part Humor; freshly sliced as a garnish. These ingredients suggest that the purpose of eating humble pie is not to punish, but to restore right relationship; not to chastise, but to challenge; not to criticize, but to care.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

Linda Thompson, Historian

The following is from a July 1942 news-calendar of the First Unitarian Church, Clyde D. Williams, Minister. These words are as important today as they were in those days.

“The First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America reads as follows:

‘Congress shall make no laws respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, of the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.’

In our sincere concern for the preservation of these fundamental liberties of a free people, let us not forget that what is guaranteed in our constitution is “the free exercise thereof,” not the right to be indifferent to our God-given freedoms. Let us not forget that the only free faith that can be maintained is an active, dynamic faith.”
