Lou Bernard - I have been a member of First UU for 11 years. I'm married to Julie Henderson, and we have two teenage daughters: Rowan (16) and Fatima (13). Both girls are SYC alumni! Our family is a multiracial family through international adoption, which has helped transform my views of family, race, politics, religion and life! At First UU, you probably know me mostly as a Sunday School teacher; I've taught 4th and 5th grade, 1st grade OWL, and seven years as an 8th grade OWL teacher. But mostly, I am known as Rowan and Tima's dad.

As an educator, I have taught in Columbus City for 28 years (24 of it teaching 4th and 5th graders). I have served on many committees and have been a part of various teams during my career: faculty representative to the union, part of many interview teams for hiring new teachers, and currently heading both the 4th grade team and the school's Technology Committee. I believe the skills that I have gained as an educator, working with diverse groups to solve problems—especially my time served on various interview teams—will allow me to serve the congregation effectively as a Search Committee member.

My life, in all aspects, revolves around family and kids. I believe this church's lifeblood, its future, lies with its families. The decision this committee makes will affect the lives of the families and children of this church, conceivably until those children leave for college. Parents, youth and RE need to have a voice on this committee, and I can be that voice.

Allie Bonsteel - I graduated from Miami University with a double major in Women's Studies and Sociology. I have also obtained an MBA. I am currently employed by a bank based in California, where I underwrite loans for small businesses. I have been a member of First UU since early 2010. The Senior Minister that is chosen by this congregation will play a significant part in shaping this wonderful community for many years to come. It would be an honor to serve on this committee.

Lisa Brandt - I first became active as a UU at Valley Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Chandler, AZ, where, having left home to start my career on the other side of the country, I found a true spiritual home—community, shared values, and music.
