What is our church leadership structure?

Our congregation is governed by the board of trustees in partnership with staff. The board of trustees is appointed by the nominating committee and confirmed at the annual meeting of the congregation.

What does Moderator do?

The Moderator presides over the business meetings and any special meetings of the church.

What does Board of Trustees do?

They oversee all issues related to personnel and property. Six trustees are elected; two each year for a term of three years. The Board then elects a board chair, vice-chair, and secretary. The board also appoints a church treasurer and an assistant treasurer. These six persons along with the Church Moderator (also elected at the annual meeting) comprise the six officers of the church. There are ex-officio members of the board as well. These are the ministers, the Director of Administration, the Director of Religious Exploration, the immediate past board chair, and two youth representatives, selected by the youth to serve a one-year term. The open board meetings are monthly on the 1st Wednesday.

What does Nominating Committee do?

The Nominating Committee is composed of six elected members serving two year terms and the immediate past chair of the board of trustees. The committee works throughout the year to identify engaged, thoughtful and energetic congregation members in good standing for consideration and election at the annual meeting. They select the board of trustee candidates, the moderator, candidates for nominating, of whom three are elected. They may also nominate members of a search committee for a settled minister if needed. The church constitution also provides a petition process of nomination.

What other leadership opportunities are there to serve within the church?

There are many opportunities for leadership outside of the Board, Nominating Committee or Moderator roles. First UU has a personnel committee, a finance team, a treasurer, assistant treasurer, and comptroller. As well as many teams working under the staff that help make church life happen: Membership, stewardship, worship, JAM, religious exploration, audio visual and grounds.

How long have you been associated with First UU?

I have been a member of First UU since 1975.

How have you been involved in the congregation and/or the larger UU community?

I have served on the Board twice, been Chair and Vice Chair of the Board and have been the Moderator once. I have been on the Nominating Committee and various other committees. I taught RE classes, sang in the choir for years, and was the church legal counsel for 40 years having just retired in 2024.

What do you value in the church's mission and community?

Why do you want to serve? To preserve our community, we rely on the democratic process. The Moderator is the one person who makes sure that our congregational meetings proceed with order and deliberation so that we can live our values moving forwards. I have been Moderator and enjoy the experience of seeing the congregation in action.

What life experiences, skills will you bring to your role in church leadership?

In my profession as an attorney, I have led many meetings of non-profit corporate boards and residential communities. I have the skills to lead a meeting, to stay on time and to keep to the agenda topics, to keep order and move a meeting to a successful conclusion.

How long have you been associated with First UU?

I began attending First UU in 2019.

I have been an active member for approximately 1.5 years, although my family also attended FUU when I was very young. it's been a warm, enriching, and stabilizing community.

How have you been involved in the congregation and/or the larger UU community?

I've been a consistent attendee on Sunday services. I'm an active member of the UU Millennial group, even hosting our Christmas party. I've also been a member of the Caregivers of Young Children group. There have also been more members of First UU that I am getting to know and it is a great community to be a part of.

FUU is my first experience with Unitarian Universalism. My Mom worked as a Presbyterian Minister and I grew up in that faith in Des Moines, St. Louis and Dallas. As a sociology grad student, one of my professors was a UU and more recently my sister joined a UU church, both contacts influenced my engagement with Unitarian Universalism

What do you value in the church's mission and community?

Like a lot of people in the world right now, I don't want traditional religion, but I do want to spend time with a group of like-minded people. We don't have to be friends with someone already, or wrestle with schedules. We just show up on Sundays and someone is always glad you're there.

I want to be a part of nurturing and building this community. I want First UU to be a place where more people who are afraid and lonely right now can feel love and hope and can see a way forward.

I want to strengthen my connections to FUU and the local community in Columbus. The biggest influences on my orientation to a service vocation have probably been how I was raised and my academic training in sociology (specifically the role of civil society in democracies).

What life experiences, skills do your bring to your role in leadership?

My career has been in listening, helping, and facilitating. I started out in tech support, and moved on to documentation and creating instructional materials. ln personal life, I organize game nights and create fun experiences for everyone. In other words, I know how listen, take in evervone's perspectives, and reach consensus.

Empathy and kindness come naturally to me. I spent 2 years hosting a podcast about atheism, and serving as the president of the Boston Atheists. As a queer single parent, I've spent a lot of time exploring and understanding my gender identity. I am an optimistic yet disillusioned millennial who values realworld connections over digital distractions. Over the past few years, I've focused on self-care, deep listening, and healthy boundaries.

An additional relevant dimension of my life experience has been my interest in Latin America. In my relationship with my wife, a Mexican immigrant, I have been challenged to improve my Spanish, learn more about Latin America, and confront my own assumptions about Mexico and immigrants. I would like to explore further ways that FUU productively engage with diversity of Central Ohio communities, across lines of race, class, gender, religion and language.

How long have you been associated with First UU?

I have attended First UU sporadically for several years. I began attending regularly for about 3 years and joined two years

How long have you been associated with First UU?
